

These You Ought to Have Done

- The Law commanded tithing the yield of seed (Lev. 27:30; Deut. 14:22)
 - Used to support the priests and Levites (Num. 18:26)
- Jesus was not critical of their care in obeying the law
- Jesus earlier taught that all the law "hangs" on the two commands to love God and to love your neighbor (22:40)
 - The great commands do not nullify, but summarize the others

These You Ought to Have Done

- Jesus condemns elevating ordinance keeping at the expense of compassion and living one's profession
 - By contrasting their meticulous effort to tithe spices
- Commandment keeping is not minimized
- Jesus said, "These you ought to have done..."
- No commandment can be "left aside"

- The problem was not in their obedience, but in their neglect
- We cannot neglect one of God's commandments in any effort aimed at honoring Him (Mark 7:9-13)
 - That would be "straining at gnats and swallowing camels"! (24)
- We must do all God commands <u>motivated</u> by His foundational principles "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8)

- Justice "means here right judgment of our fellow-men"
 - An indicator of our love for God and our fellow man
 - "you tithe... and neglect justice and the love of God" (Luke 11:42)
- Me seeing others like God sees them
- Me treating others without partiality
- Me doing what is right toward all others at all times

- Mercy means "forbearance toward the guilty and compassion toward the suffering"
 - Like God has shown me (Titus 3:5)
- Toward all (James 2:13) and especially my brethren (Gal. 6:1)
- Taking pity on and action for those in need (1 John 3:17-18)
- Jesus promised the "merciful" shall "obtain mercy" (Mt. 5:7)

"Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others."

- Faithfulness "is both the belief in truth and the habitual manifestation of that belief in the life"
- Faithfulness is demonstrated proof of faith
 - "I hear of your love and of the faith that you have toward the Lord Jesus and for all the saints" (Philemon 1:5)

Trust and Obey

An observable fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22)

Justice and mercy are giving others what they are due Faithfulness is giving God what He is due

We must do all God commands motivated by His foundational principles

That is what the LORD requires of us (Micah 6:8)

"These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others."
