

Setting the Scene (9-10)

- Jesus went out around the Sea of Galilee (Mark 2:13)
- Matthew (Levi Mark 2:14; Luke 5:27)
- Sitting in the tax office or toll booth
- Jesus said "Follow Me" and Matthew did
- Then Matthew held a reception in Jesus' honor (Luke 5:29)
 - And he invited his friends and co-workers
- So Jesus was eating with many "tax-gatherers and sinners"

Self-Righteous Reaction (11)

- When the "scribes of the Pharisees" (Mark 2:16) saw this
- Why is your teacher "eating with...?"
 - Generally indicates association and identification with (1 Cor. 5:11)
- "tax-gatherers"
 - "Because of their extortion and positions as agents of Rome, the publicans were socially rejected, religiously excommunicated, and politically viewed as traitors." – (Willis)
- "sinners"
 - Irreligious Jews who did not strictly follow the Rabbinic traditions
- Intended to discredit Jesus in the eyes of His disciples

A Proverbial Answer (12)

- "those who are healthy" do not need a doctor
 - Parallel to "the righteous" (vs. 13)
 - How the Pharisees thought of themselves (Luke 18:9)
- It is "those who are sick" that need a physician
 - Parallel to "sinners" (vs. 13)
 - How the Pharisees thought of others (Luke 18:9)
- Jesus does not declare the Pharisees "righteous"
 - But He knows how they will hear His words
- He does declare "sinners" in need of a physician

Learn What This Means (13)

- "I desire compassion, and not sacrifice" (Hosea 6:6)
 - "faithfulness" or "loyalty" (NKJV/NASB) or "steadfast love" (ESV)
- God has no desire for sacrifices without faithfulness
- Only through faith can one be made righteous (Rom. 3:22)
- The righteous know of God's mercy and compassion
- The righteous extend God's mercy and compassion to others
- That is what Jesus came to do...

"I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners..."

Learn What This Means

- 1. Warns of the danger of not seeing our own sickness
 - John 9:39-41; Rom. 3:23; 1 John 1:8
- 2. Distinguishes between being separate and being isolated
 - John 17:14-18; Matt. 5:13-16
- 3. Does not justify social identification with sinners
 - 2 Cor. 6:14-16; 1 Cor. 15:33
- 4. Encourages compassionate attempts to reach the lost
